What is known is that this represents a huge and costly setback for the club. And it happens at the worst time imaginable, right before our showcase event, the Labor Day Air Show. There will need to be a huge effort on the part of the club to get the damage repaired before the show.

started at the center of the back of the shelter. The deck and the railing around the shelter were completely destroyed. The eight heavy posts that support the roof were also badly burned.

The roof of the structure sustained the least damage and is still largely intact, although the plywood ceiling was badly scorched and was pulled down by the fire department in order to make sure that the fire was out.

The plan for repairing the shelter is to support the roof and rebuild the deck and supports underneath it. The expense of the rebuilding will be borne by the Omahawks because of a good news/bad news situation with the city parks department. The good news is that the city has insurance, the bad news is that their deductible is \$100,000, much higher than the cost of the shelter.

Much more information will be available at the meeting on Friday. Be sure to come out to the field and see for yourself what ahs happened and what you can do to help the club recover from this disaster.


# SPC COMBAT EVENT
