
Non-permit holders flying at Hawk Field – It continues to be a problem.

SPC COMPETITIVE FUN FLY WAS FUN AND COMPETITIVE

Saturday, June 24th saw the second leg of the 2011 Sport Pilot Championship series take place at Hawk Field. Early morning rain cleared off and pilots were treated to temperatures in the 70's, partly cloudy skies, and a gentle breeze. Hot dogs, chips, pop, and

water were all available for pilots and spectators alike.

Eight of the twenty registered SPC pilots showed up to compete, with event organizer Ed Paasch bowing out from flying that day to run the contest as flight line boss.

The first event was a timed contest for "roop" touch 'n go passes. Each pilot had to take off, then perform a roll followed by a loop (or a roop), and then do a touch n' go, landing after the fifth "roop." It sounded easy enough, but pilots discovered it wasn't so easy to slow down for a touch 'n go immediately after coming out of an outside loop. Pilot Darren Will pulled the main gear out of his World Models Skyraider Mach II, while Mikey Furrow overshot the runway and missed getting a touch'n'go down between two roops.

The second event was the Taxi Slalom course. Eight safety cones were set out and he pilots had to weave their way between them, then turn around and come back, completing two full circuits. No penalties were charged for striking a cone, but a prop strike against one of the cones stopped Mikey Furrow's sporster dead in



its tracks near the end of his second lap. Larry McChesney worked hard to complete the course when one of his main gear retracted when it wasn't supposed to. That knocked him out of the rest of the day's events.

Next was the Limbo pass. Each pilot had to complete five laps while trying to pass under a 5' high "limbo" streamer stretched across the runway. Pilots scored points for each successful pass under the streamer, but their run would end if they touched down or cut the streamer. Pilots Tom Floyd and Fred Tuckerman battled to perfection; both flying under the ribbon on all five passes. Tom Floyd managed to squeak past Fred's total time of 1:46 by less than half a second, completing the challenge in 1:45.55. Mikey Furrow flew a strong third place, getting under the streamer on his second and third passes before cutting it on his fourth attempt.

Last was the Target Touch 'N Go event. A 4 ft by 8 ft target was taped out at the center of the runway. The children at the event were then invited out to color in the target area with sidewalk chalk, providing contrast to the

black asphalt runway.
Each pilot was allowed
five passes to score three
hits. Only Tom Floyd, Fred
Tuckerman, and Roland
Lyons managed to score a
single hit each. Tom completed his circuits about
seven seconds faster than
Fred Tuckerman to scratch
out a win.

The pilots remarked how much fun they had

competing in each of the unusual events. The spectators enjoyed the competition as well, with the Limbo Pass being particularly popular with onlookers.

Helen Paasch once again assembled her crack team of SPC volunteers, including grillmaster Jim Burnette and chief score-keeper Pam Felthauser. Dennis Bender proved himself invaluable as the head time keeper. Many thanks go out to the spectators and members who helped tape together the limbo streamer over and over as well as cheer for the pilots and make sure we got the food eaten!

Chaos reigns at Hawk Field









Hawk Field drew scores of spectators on Saturday, July 23rd as folks turned out to watch the third and final event in the 2011 Sport Pilot Championship. It was a day that turned out to be full of surprises, and also a day that lived up to expectations as pilots battled furiously to compete while thrilling the crowd from start to finish.

The first amazing surprise of the day? The weather actually cooperated; an occurence almost unheard of in the threeyear history of the SPC. The forecast had called for 100F degree temperatures with a heat index from 105F to 110F, but pilots and spectators were treated instead to temperatures in the low 90s and a nice bit of breeze for most of the day. Mostly cloudy skies throughout the event made the planes a bit harder to follow, but made all the difference in keeping the crowd comfortable. Sprinkles even threatened to dampen the fun once or twice, but never amounted to more than a single drop or two of moisture throughout the contest.

The second amazing surprise of the day turned out to be the lack of mid-air collisions. The previous two SPC combat events had each been impacted (pun intended) by multiple mid-air collisions. Despite plenty of very intensive dogfighting, the 2011 SPC combat event went from start to finish without a single collision event either in the air or on the runway. We did have a couple of pilots lose orientation while dogfighting, which ended up with a couple of planes down in the woods. Another pilot had a deadstick landing right after takeoff that resulted in a busted firewall and early retirement from the day's activities. Everyone managed to score cuts and compete fiercely without slapping two planes together, however; a first in SPC combat.

The day was expected to be a shoot-out between the two previous SPC Combat champions, Fred Tuckerman (2009 champ) and Tom Floyd (2010 champ). The two pilots had already proven their combat prowess, but hadn't competed head-to-head in combat previously. Tom Floyd didn't compete in the Sport Pilot Championship the year that Fred won the combat event, and Fred missed the combat segment last year when Tom won it. To add to the matchup, Fred Tuckerman and Tom Floyd came into the SPC Combat event ranked 1 and 2 respectively overall for the first two

events. The two pilots didn't disappoint, either, as both flew extremely well and both had a number of kills throughout the five rounds of competition.

The biggest surprise of the day, however, began to take shape during the very first heat of Round 1. SPC Pilot Rich Walker scored a "kill" (cutting an opponent's streamer) during his very first heat. Why was this surprising? This was the first season that Rich has competed in the Sport Pilot Championship, and he'd never competed in combat before. It quickly became apparent that Rich's early success was no fluke. Rich's talent for combat became quite clear as he scored well in round after round of competition, and he quickly broke up any thoughts that it would be a "two horse race" as he crashed the party at the top of the leader board.

The large group of spectators enjoyed an afternoon of very competitive flying. SPC pilots Casey Vohnout, Darren Will, Randy Seggerman, and Kevin Lowens all enjoyed success as they scored kills throughout various rounds. Pilots Gary Vohnout, Larry McChesney, and Mikey Furrow competed valiantly despite being forced from the field of battle early. All five rounds of combat were typified by skillful flying and a surprising lack of crashing and mayhem, and the crowd of onlookers happily cheered on the contestants.

When the final heat was completed and all of the scores were finally totalled, Rich Walker's surprising debut proved to be the shock of the day as he outscored both Fred Tuckerman and Tom Floyd to take 1st Place for the SPC Combat event. Fred managed to outpace Tom Floyd's late run to solidify his 2nd place finish. Tom Floyd finished in a very strong 3rd place to take the final trophy of the day.

The terrific turnout and the great flying made for a truly memorable event. It's easy to guage the success of a flying contest when the pilots end the day by discussing what they're going to do next year. My sincere thanks go out to each and every one of the competitors who made the SPC Combat event such a great deal of fun!

Last month's plane was strange plane from way back when. Designed in the late 1930s, the Northrup P-56 had no horizontal stabilizer, and a newly designed engine driving counter-rotating pusher props. It was also built

out of magnesium, which was a new material for building airplanes. Only two prototypes were built and it was ultimately cancelled as too risky.

But the most amazing thing about last month's plane is that EJ Murphy was actually faster in identifying it than Dean Copeland (by two whole minutes!), so there's hope for you. Get out your airplane books and



find this one first. The glory will be all yours!
