Safety Notes

Our first safety tip this month is regarding the ever so sharp nylon props, hand starting or just holding the prop while tightening the prop nut can cut you to the bone. Always wear a glove when hand starting. Either wear a glove or wrap a towel around the prop when tightening the prop nut.

A second safety issue is the use of gasoline for the gas powered planes. We still have people smoking at the field within just a few feet of gas cans and gas powered planes. It is your duty to maintain a reasonable distance from people smoking or any type of open fire. A fire extinguisher should be present at the field and if not have some sort of plan to extinguish a fire should one occur.

Every one should have some medical supplies in the car, even a minor cut can be serious if not treated well enough to provide the time to get to an emergency room for proper treatment.

Last but not least; **NEVER FLY ALONE**

And on the light side: "Take offs are optional but landings are mandatory."

Safety first as it can't be last.

Aeronca Project

An on-going project for club member **Bob Burt** has been his large scale <u>Aeronca Champ</u> of late 40s vintage. The plane is an Aeronca 7AC at one third scale. Wingspan is 140 inches. Approximate weight 35 pounds. Engine installed is a Turnigy 52cc gas. The Aeronca plans were obtained from RCM.

Bob carved his own nose cowl since there are no fiberglass cowls available. I was going to glass my own, but decided to just go with the wood. Behind the cowl, the firewall is aluminum sheeted and the rest of the cowl uses the same aluminum. Bob has just recently started painting the fuse using Nelson Products paint. This is the same type of paint he has used several times before with good results. According to Bob, it does an excellent job of covering the model, and it is brushed on in about 6 coats. Tips & Tricks

Wires

Get a hold of a junk VCR and take it apart. Quite often there are a lot of wire harnesses in it. While the wire is other colors, as well as black and red, it is high quality and works very well for RC hookups.

Lite Ply Replacement

My favorite material is "doorskins" to use in place of Lite Ply. You can purchase these at your local building supply company for around 5 bucks. The sheets are 36-inches wide by 80-inches high and about 1/8-inch thick. I have used this in place of Lite Ply in fuselage sides, hatches, landing gear mounts, servo mounts, etc., and have never had a failure.

Plywood on the cheap

Also along those lines, cabinet makers have birch- and oak-faced ply pieces in different sizes 1/4-inches thick, that they will sell to you for a reasonable price. I use these for firewalls, gear mounts in bigger airplanes, and you can double them up to make firewalls for gas engines.

Hardwood

For spars, I use $1/4 \times 8$ feet poplar or maple. One board can be carefully cut in a table saw with a fine blade (be safe when you use power tools). You can cut these in $1/4 \times 3/8$, $1/4 \times 1/2$, etc. and make enough sticks to last for years!
