

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

## RC Slope Soaring - Kansas Style

Last month I promised you yet one more article on slope



soaring; this time about what you can do at faraway places. When you find yourself in a Kansas greasy-spoon ordering breakfast and discussing wind conditions with a local rancher, artist or town drunk; or heading to a historic German hilltop where most of the *Luftwaffe* trained in 1930's, you realize this must be really fun

to have gone to this much trouble to enjoy it. Those special places, often hard to find or reach, offer special rewards for those willing to find them.

As **Tim Peters** discovered from his Iowa friends, slope sites are a bit like fishing holes or mushroom patches; those who have found them may not be inclined to have them become popular. I have little doubt that there are great




slope sites within an hour of where we live, if only we could find them. But the best expression of one that has become popular is Wilson Lake, Kansas. The "clearest lake in Kansas", about halfway between Salina and

Russell, just a few miles north of I-70. That's 240 miles from Lincoln, so a bit of planning and commitment is required. The local lodging establishments comment that there are 3 big events every year: pheasant season, walleye season and model airplanes. So you will be welcomed with open cash registers.

Wilson is blessed with any number of hills that can accommodate almost any wind direction. The best is a S or SE wind on the big hill in Lucas Park. It's about 200 feet high with clean air coming over the lake and a generous plateau landing area at the top, complete with a parking lot. Another is Minooka Park with a NW wind. Rather than

ramble on, just go to <a href="http://midwestslopechallenge.com/">http://midwestslopechallenge.com/</a> to get a feel for the event and the local area.





miles north of the lake, is an entertaining quirky artist community that typically makes the lists of top 10 things to see in Kansas. Plus you can treat her to the most delightfully unexpected dinner at the

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Bunker Hill Café, just 20 miles west; a 4-star restaurant in a no-star town. Or if you feel the call of nature, the main street of Lucas features what is quite possibly the most ornate public bathroom on the planet. Really! You could conceivably emerge from the trip on the positive side of the relationship ledger. There are many campgrounds at the lake, or check out the Midland Hotel in Wilson if you'd prefer a mattress.

So let's say you've made the journey, what to fly? First of all, everything that flew back at home will fly just fine at Wilson; Kansas has passed the same laws of physics as



Nebraska (other than that tricky conception thing). You might find that the perfect day starts with moderate winds and light planes, not unlike flying at Chalco. As those winds increase, you pull the next heaviest planes out of the car, one after another. Till the that you're authentic WW2 warbirds and full-tilt racers in a 40 mph wind by 2:00... Yes, those days do happen and they are special.

So warbirds; picture power planes without engines. Meticulously finished and absolute scale other than the lack of sound. These are scale renditions of almost anything, typically constructed of EPP foam (*just like the planes I* 


recommended last month), with a chunk of lead in the nose instead of an engine and a prop. The beauty of these planes is that you can literally fly them in your face. Work the lift out from the hill to gain some altitude, turn back in a dive,



and come whooshing past the edge of the hill, as close as you dare; climb from the inertia into a rudder only turn, somewhat like a skateboard ramp, and repeat. Do it in harmony with a friend in formation and it takes on another dimension. The best commercial expression of power slope soaring is *Leading Edge Gliders*, actually located in Lucas, Kansas. They are a bit unpredictable on availability and delivery times, but their product is absolute first class. Go to: <a href="http://www.leadingedgegliders.com">http://www.leadingedgegliders.com</a>

And that gets us to the next level. Open class racing. If you have a lot of money, and a reasonable amount of talent, and don't mind flying close to another equally impressive plane, you can invest in a \$2,000 hollow molded,



3.5 meter span plane, capable of flying very fast and turning even faster. At the *Midwest Slope Challenge*, the event is run as a double elimination, man on man (*or woman I suppose*) event. For a spectator, some of the best flying you will ever

see. These planes are flying 5 laps between two pylons 500 feet apart, complete with judges and flaggers; it's impressive!

But if you're more into the beauty of full scale soaring,



there is no better place to fly your giant scale sailplane than on a slope. You may have seen my 4-meter *KA-6* sailplane getting aero towed at Mead, but its maiden flight was on the slope at Wilson. And it was a perfect expression of soaring, one that I have not been able to top. I cannot imagine a more perfect picture than a giant scale sailplane on a giant scale slope... If you've ever seen videos from Torrey Pines in San Diego,

you get the idea.

But if you've managed to read this far, you might be hooked and will not get away that easily. Next month, a <u>final</u> article on *Wasserkupppe*; quite possibly the coolest place on the planet for silent flight, 1920 or now.

In a recent newspaper article it seems the state of Texas just passed a law prohibiting the use of RC Quadcopters (*or any such device meaning airplanes too!*) to record a video that infringes on personal or business privacy. The fine is \$500 first offense and subject to civil prosecution up to \$10,000. This sounds nuts to me, but obviously

someone has something to hide. Most modelers would agree their videos are harmless pictures of flying fields, hobby events, etc. A few detectives might be pursuing the cheating spouse, or the like. But this infringement on the hobby is a step in the wrong direction. This could lead to more regulation that is unnecessary. 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




















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## Doc's and Gary's Piggy Back Ride


