Staggerwing Build - Part II

Now that we're back from Phoenix and the *Coronavirus* has everyone hunkered down, I'm getting some good traction on the *Staggerwing*.

Most of the internal mechanics are finished, which is the bulk of this build. Cabin struts


have been installed, which are needed if you decide to cut out the windshield and side windows. I also added a former to stiffen the fuselage mid-way toward the back of the plane. I thought it was a little weak without one.

The aileron and flap linkages have been something totally different and are well-engineered. There are no exposed pushrods or horns on this model.

Everything is internal. A torque rod is epoxied into the aileron and flap (*see picture*). The other end of the rod has a square fitting that slides into a socket when the wings are installed. These sockets have arms which are then connected to the servo. Pretty clever.

With all this time spent at home, my wife actually asked me if I had another plane to work on after this one. Of course!! Happy building and I hope you're all staying healthy.

Documentaries Worth Viewing




If you find yourselves about to climb the walls in your homes, and need a break from building that airplane, then check out these documentaries. They are available on *Amazon Prime Video*. I've watched all three and give them five stars.



Pancho Barnes was a bigger than life person with a colorful flying background. She had much interaction with the infamous USAF test pilots at *Edwards AFB* in the 1940s. It was Pancho's ranch and land that the government condemned and took for the expansion of Edwards AFB. Run time 1 hr 4 min.



This is about training thousands of Army Air Corps pilots at over 700 airfields across the US leading up to and during WWII. Interviews with several of the surviving Army Air Corps pilots make this an interesting documentary. Some good footage of the actual aircraft and training back then. Run time 1 hr 54 min.



This is about America's first supersonic fighter, the F-100 Super Saber. A fact about this late 1950s fighter is that it flew more combat sorties in the Viet Nam war than any other fighter. Interviews with former "Hun" pilots reveal much about the F-100 and its flight characteristics. Such as adverse yaw in a rolling turn. Run time 1 hr 30 min.

Fokker D-VII Finished

John Millie is a builder. John enjoys coming out and flying too, but he really loves to build things. Airplanes, cars, boats, steam engines, you name it. Like many of the WRCF members, John has been building models since his childhood. Also, like many WRCF members, he gets the most satisfaction from the building of his models. John likes to fly too, but I dare say

he enjoys the building process even more than the flying. I don't have any problem buying a foam model and flying it that same day, but Johnny loves to find an old unbuilt kit and seeing it take shape, piece by piece.

One day last year I was at his house looking over his collection and I saw an airframe all built up that had not yet been covered. It was beautiful. It was a Semi-Big Fun Scale Fokker D7 kit from Orline RC Aircraft with a 72" wingspan. The workmanship was something to marvel at. It would have taken me months to build it, and then it would have looked like something a novice would have made. I think John said it had taken him less than two weeks to complete. I could not get over how delicate the structure was on the wings, with cap strips on every rib and nose rib. Built up ailerons and elevator. To me it was a work of art. John said he had gotten his fun out of it, and asked if I would like to have it, to finish and fly. I said of course I would, and I took it home. I sat it on my coffee table and just admired the workmanship.


A year later, I finally asked John and Scott Kuhn if they would help me with the covering, and they both happily volunteered. I hauled the Fokker back to John's basement, and over a recent weekend the three of us got it covered. John supplied the transparent red Monokote film, just like the model on the box art was covered with. It is the perfect choice to show off the delicate structure underneath. I decided to power the bird with an electric setup instead of the .60 to .80 glow recommended by the manufacturer. The model predates 4 stroke glow and electric power options. The trim will be a tongue in cheek nod to Charlie Chaplin's movie, The Great Dictator. I hope to have it finished in time for our WWI & Golden Age Fun Fly, I just hope we still get to hold the event given current world conditions.

Vailly Sea Fury - Part III

Here's the latest with my winter project. The *Vailly* designed *Sea Fury* was kitted by *Precision Cut* and it has a 90" wingspan. It will have a twin 70cc gas engine pulling it around. Also an auto start for the engine. I'm building this from a short-kit and plans. The *Sea Fury* has been a fun build so far.

The construction of the *Sea Fury* is completed and the electronics and engine are installed. The *Sierra* retracts are scale and work perfectly.

I built a 3 piece wing for ease of transporting. The joint is between the aileron and the outer flap. I used aircraft grade plywood for the dihedral blade with a three bolt locking system. Flaps interlock between the inner and outer so one servo can be used. I find this to be a reliable construction technique as I have used this on a giant *P-51*, *P-47*, *AT-6*, and my *Corsair*. I have several years of flying with all of them. You have to wait till next month to see the color scheme I have chosen.













Launch Trolley with Cradle

A while back I mentioned a 'launch trolley' that good friend and fellow WRCF Jud Bock gave me. I have a couple of planes that have no landing gear and are a little challenging for me to launch. I had seen Jud launch Old Timer planes with the trolley and asked him if he had plans or dimensions to share. Good guy that he

is, he just gave me the trolley. And weasel that I am I was more than willing to accept!

The trolley was intended for use with my ~15' span Airtronics Sagitta sailplane. The trolley was too wide to securely hold the sailplane, so I crafted a cradle using half-inch PVC pipe and couplings. If you check the photos you'll see that the cradle clamps onto the trolley using screws and blind nuts. Two vertical wires positioned in front of the wing leading edge keep the glider in place until enough airspeed is reached; then the plane lifts out of the cradle. I liked this setup so much that I created another cradle for the 2m wingspan Skyhunter foamy plane. The Skyhunter has a wider fuselage, therefore the need for a wider cradle. The cradles are easily removed and swapped out as needed.

Just looking for some good weather to fly. It's 23 degrees today and the wind is blowing at 45 mph. \bigcirc
