Treasurer's Report








Mead Field Weather Station

- Things Going On -

Here's an experience I'd like to share with you having to do with selling an engine on RCGroups. Couple of weeks ago I set an ad for an O.S. Max FS 90 four-stroke I wanted to unload. I priced it at \$115 with cost of shipping split between seller/buyer. Also that I would only ship "lower 48."

Two weeks after placing the ad, I received a reply asking if I'd be willing to ship the engine to Israel. That the buyer would be willing to pay my asking price and full cost of shipping. Long story short; I said that I would consider and seek cost estimate for shipping through his preferred USPS. Also the buyer said he could transfer funds using PayPal as I requested. Least cost to ship the engine is \$24 and as much as \$130. The post office assured me that there would be no additional costs at my end. But the buyer may have a customs fee. I'm waiting on the buyer's response and willingness to buy now.

Let it Snow

This past Sunday me and Rene Mayo did some snow flying at the field. Perfect day for it; an inch or two of snow on an unspoiled runway, 35 to 40 degree temps, sunny and no wind. This was Rene's first snow excursion. We outfitted her Seniorita with an old set of skis from my archives. I flew the *Telemaster*.

You can see detail of my skis in one of the pictures. While you can get store bought ones from *DuBro*, these are homemade. Used a hot wire to cut a foam block to the desired curvature and then as a former to



laminate 4 pieces of 1/32" plywood with slow epoxy. The key is to have some kind of spring loaded setup to keep the tips up in the air and lets them follow the ground on landing. I used strings and springs anchored to the landing gear. The fancy ones have internal spring arrangements. There is a mini-ski replacing the tail wheel as well.

You can also fly with a set of water floats, although I think true skis look much better.

On a perfect day like this, the flying was special. Takeoffs and landings are pretty much what you'd call normal, other than leaving visual evidence in the snow of crooked takeoffs. In fact, you may find yourself spending more time taxiing or doing touch and goes than actually



in the air. So give it a try, you might find it the perfect way to break the winter blues. It may be due to low winter humidity, but you might notice your plane positively glows against a bright blue sky.

Just don't drive on the runway! While foot tracks are ugly enough, tire tracks would be a disgrace. I was glad that the runway got a late October mowing, so there are no tufts of grass getting in the way.

Also, on behalf of anyone else who does not go into winter flying hibernation, thanks to whoever didn't put the starting stands into storage. They came in most handy, especially vs kneeling in snow ©

Byron Staggerwing Progress

I decided to kick things up a notch this winter by tackling a *Byron's Staggerwing*, which I found on *RCGroups*. This is different type of build for me since it's a fiberglass fuse with foam wings and tail. It seems like it will be a light-weight airplane once completed (*hoping* for 18 lbs. or so).

At first glance this would appear to be an easier build since the fuse, wings, and tail are already built. However, the real challenge is putting the structure inside the fuse. It's like building a ship in a bottle with its frustrations. Also, there are a number of interesting mechanisms that need to be built to accommodate the removable wings. And the landing gear struts are built-up as well.

I'm planning to power it with a *DLE 35*, which is same sized engine the plans call for. I'll most likely glass the foam wings and tail, then paint it. This will add some weight but hopefully not too much.

I've blended those new with past skills and found new energy for details on the SBD.
