- Things Going On by Nelson Carpenter

Only a few days remain as of this newsletter publication to get your comments sent in to the FAA regarding the proposed rules and regulations directed at drone activity inclusive of our hobby aircraft. Many members of Western Flyers have provided comments. Hopefully all of the comments sent will get

noticed, and not just tallied.

In the meantime, we need to be vigilant when flying our models by staying well out of the way of manned aircraft flying over or near *Mead Field*. Such as cropdusters we see now and then, as well as general aviation aircraft and the occasional helicopter. Get down low (*not you....your airplane....*) or even land until the traffic is gone.

Photo is of my *Volantex Ranger 2000* that will become my camera platform. As you see, it is an EP pusher that frees up the forward cockpit and fuselage area for cameras. I'm using a 30A ESC with 3S battery. Pushing it around is a *Turnigy* D2836/8 *1100KV* Brushless outrunner motor. Wingspan is 81 inches. Throttle, ailerons, flaps, elevator, and rudder for control. Wings and tail surface are foam and the fuse a "*milk bottle-like*" plastic that is durable.



We have one last "upkeep" project to do on our storage building this spring. Above the garage door a few sheets of plywood that are rotted need to be replaced. Then painted. If you can swing a hammer or use a brush, get in touch with Loren Blinde or myself.

Only 11 weeks until our first club fun fly. That being the "WWI and Golden Age" Fun Fly. With it being AMA sanctioned, we could see a very good turnout. So get your aircraft spiffed up and ready. With this fun fly theme, there is no requirement on size – small electric or huge gasser.

Some of you have asked about what qualifies for *Golden Age* aircraft. The *Smithsonian Institution National Air & Space Museum* defines it as "peacetime aviation between 1919 and 1939." Next page are samples obtained from a 1988 *Smithsonian* calendar.

About 40 years ago, my Dad and I were flying gliders at the *Cobra Field* south of *Council Bluffs, IA*. We were using high-start setups (*rubber bungee and strong fishing line*) to launch our planes. I don't remember what I was flying but Dad had a

Mark's Models Windward sailplane. It was a nice plane; Mark's Models was a California company and in the early-to-mid 1970's their sailplanes were well known and very competitive.

It was a fun day until the guy launching the *Windward* attached it to the high-start, stretched out the bungee, and <u>failed to turn on the receiver switch</u>. That was well before the term '*My Bad*' was trendy. Oddly enough, without benefit or radio control, the glider went straight up the tow, released, and proceeded to circle in the slight downwind across interstate I-29, over some fields and landed in a tree at the base of the bluffs to the east. The next day I skipped some classes (*in college at the time*), climbed the tree (*Famous WRCF tree climber Tom Wild will be amused by that image*) and rescued the plane which was pretty much undamaged. Dunno what happened to the plane after that.

In discussing Ancient R/C History with WRCF glider pundit Loren Blinde, we talked about the Marks Models kits and I mentioned that I'd like to build their other kit "Windfree", or possibly another Windward. In early January Loren email'd me about an eBay sale for a Windward kit. A few days later it arrived and it was time to clear the building board.

It was an easy build as the kit was probably meant for beginners. The only real change was to fit it for electric flight. The *Windward* weighs about 2 pounds ready-for-flight. Colors are white and deep red *Monokote*, the roundels makes it sort-of resemble a *British* training glider. First test flight was completed Monday February 24th. It went perfect as the photo might lead you to believe.
